AB 1111 (Berman, 2021)

Assembly Bill No. 1111 (AB 1111) established new Education Code 66725.5 and stated the following:

- "(a) (1) To streamline transfer from two- to four-year postsecondary educational institutions and reduce excess credit accumulation, on or before July 1, 2024, both of the following shall occur:
 - (A) The California Community Colleges shall adopt a common course numbering system for all general education requirement courses and transfer pathway courses.
 - (B) Each community college campus shall incorporate common course numbers from the adopted common course numbering system in its catalog.
 - (2) The common course numbering system shall be student facing...and ensure that comparable courses across all community colleges have the same course number."


Why Common Course Numbering?

Students move between colleges

- Among associate degree completers 2011-2021, on average:
 - 56% completed all coursework in 1 CCC
 - 28% completed coursework in 2 CCCs
 - 17% completed coursework in 3 or more CCCs
- This trend holds for 2018-2021
- Consistent with 2011-2021, completers who attend more than one college accrue more units:

Academic Year	1 College	2 Colleges	3+ Colleges
2018-2019	77	83	92
2019-2020	76	82	90
2020-2021	74	81	88

Planning: AB 1111 Task Force

To design an effective CCN, the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) established a statewide task force in 2022. Its charge was:

Assembly Bill No. 1111: Common Course Numbering Task Force (hereafter "CCN Task Force") is charged with working collaboratively across the California Community Colleges and the system's key stakeholders to inform the development of an implementation plan for fulfilling the requirements of AB 1111. AB 1111 calls for ensuring that "comparable courses across all community colleges have the same course number" through a student-facing common course numbering system.

- Review of CCN templates for UCTCA, Cal-GETC

Impacts & Implications: Acknowledge the Tensions

- •CCN requires a shift from complete COR college autonomy to a degree of intentional alignment and similarity needed for system-level articulation needed for students
 - NOT common curriculum
 - Academic freedom in local COR, faculty syllabi and approach to teaching each class
- •Vision depends on UC and CSU changes to current articulation processes
- •Local curriculum & catalog processes are already impacted by Cal-GETC, ADT, GE, and AB 1705 changes and more
- •There will be impacts on people, technology, local processes
- There is a lot of uncertainty
