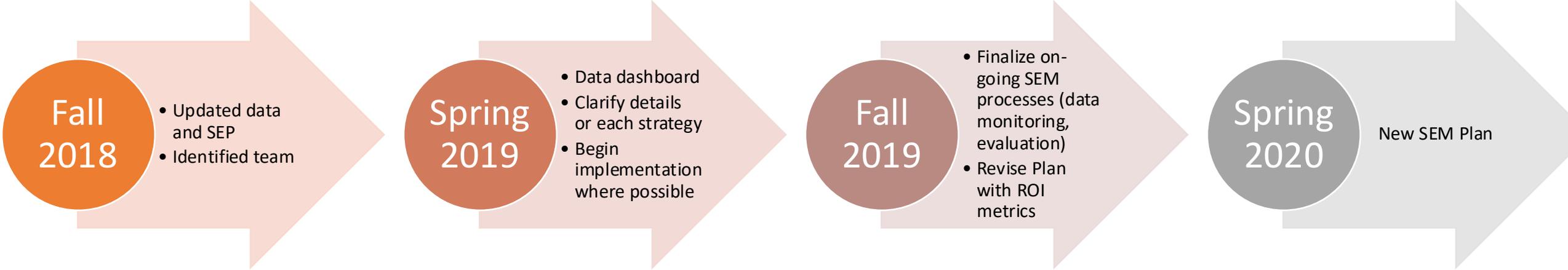
# Strategic enrollment planning phases

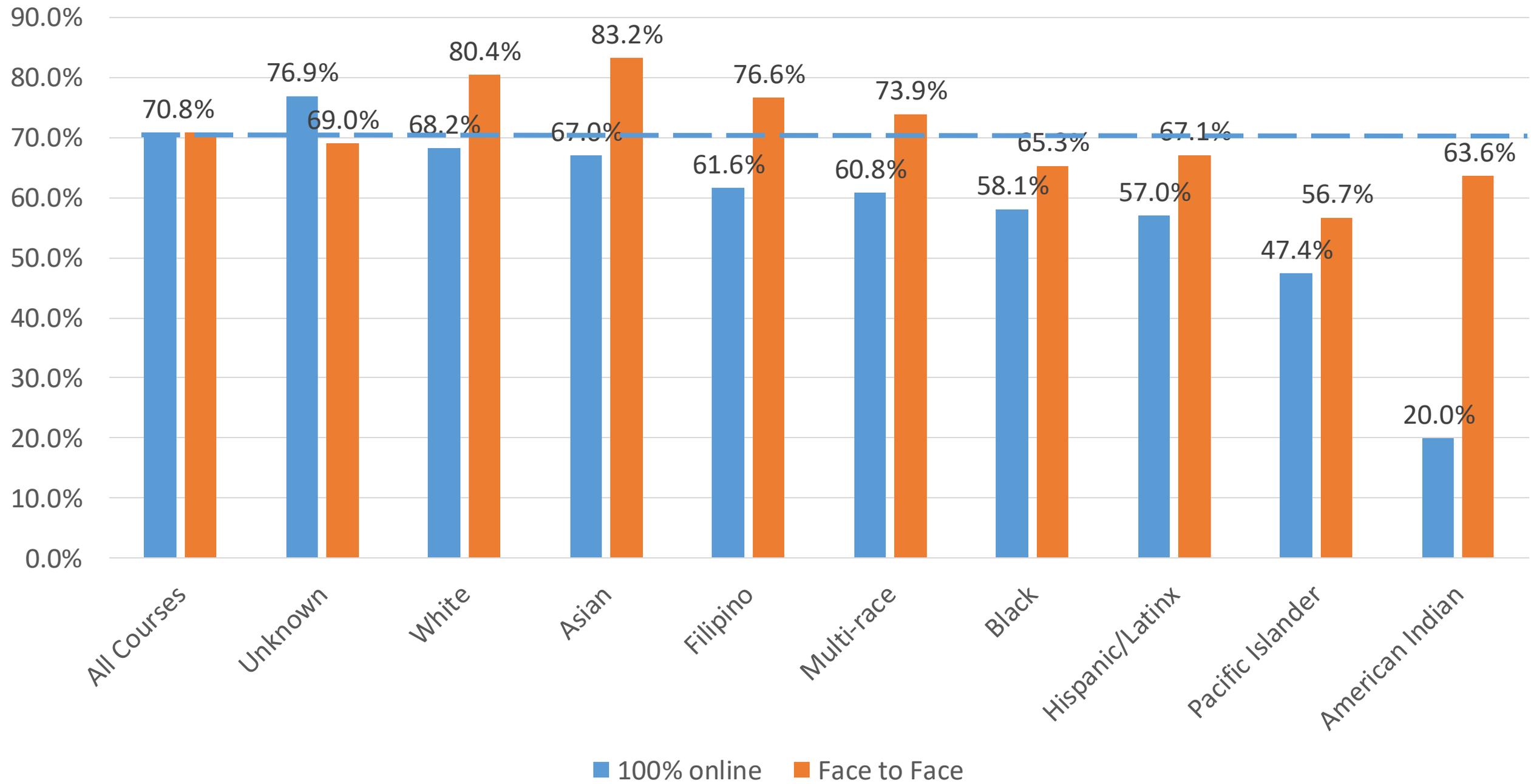
# Missing strategies?

- Alerts and interventions – Success Teams?

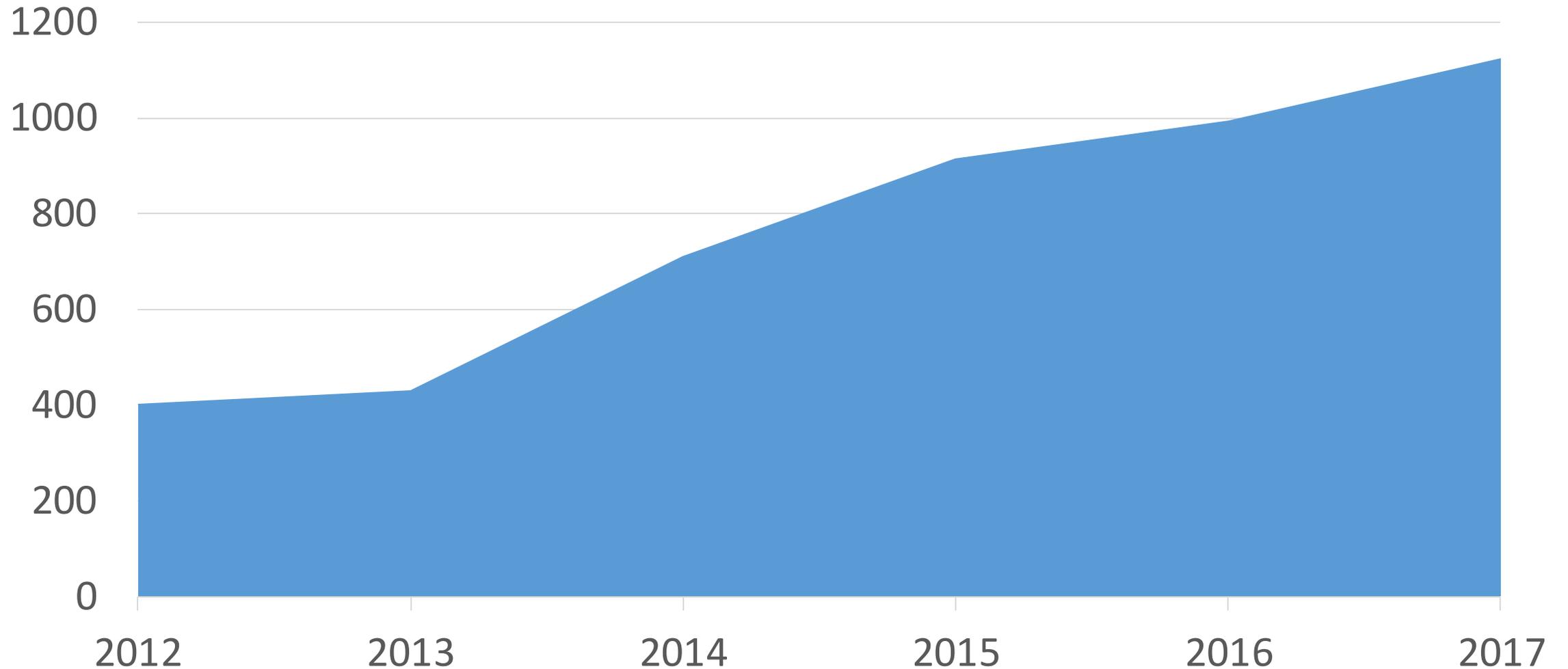

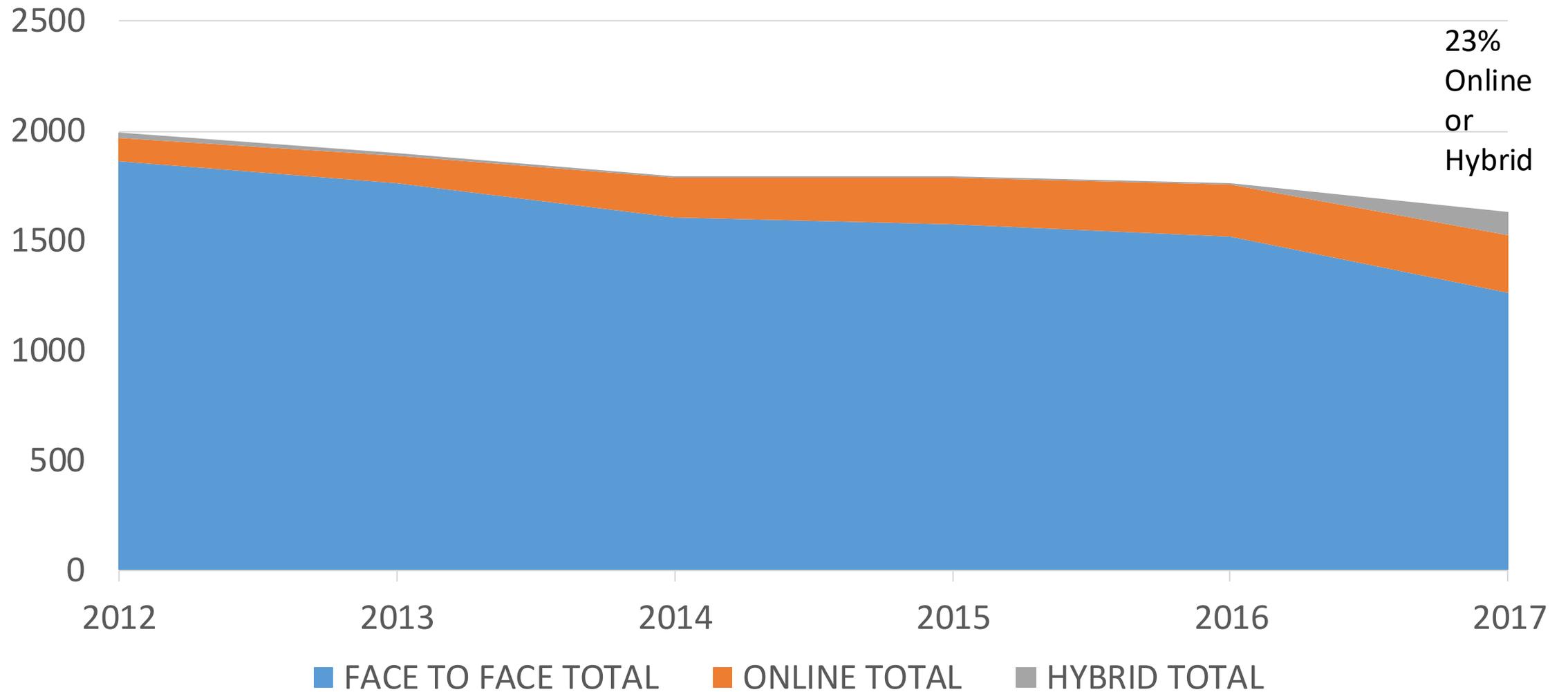
Fall 2017 Course Success Rates by Race/Ethnicity: Online v. Face to Face

# Impact of online enrollments: FTES



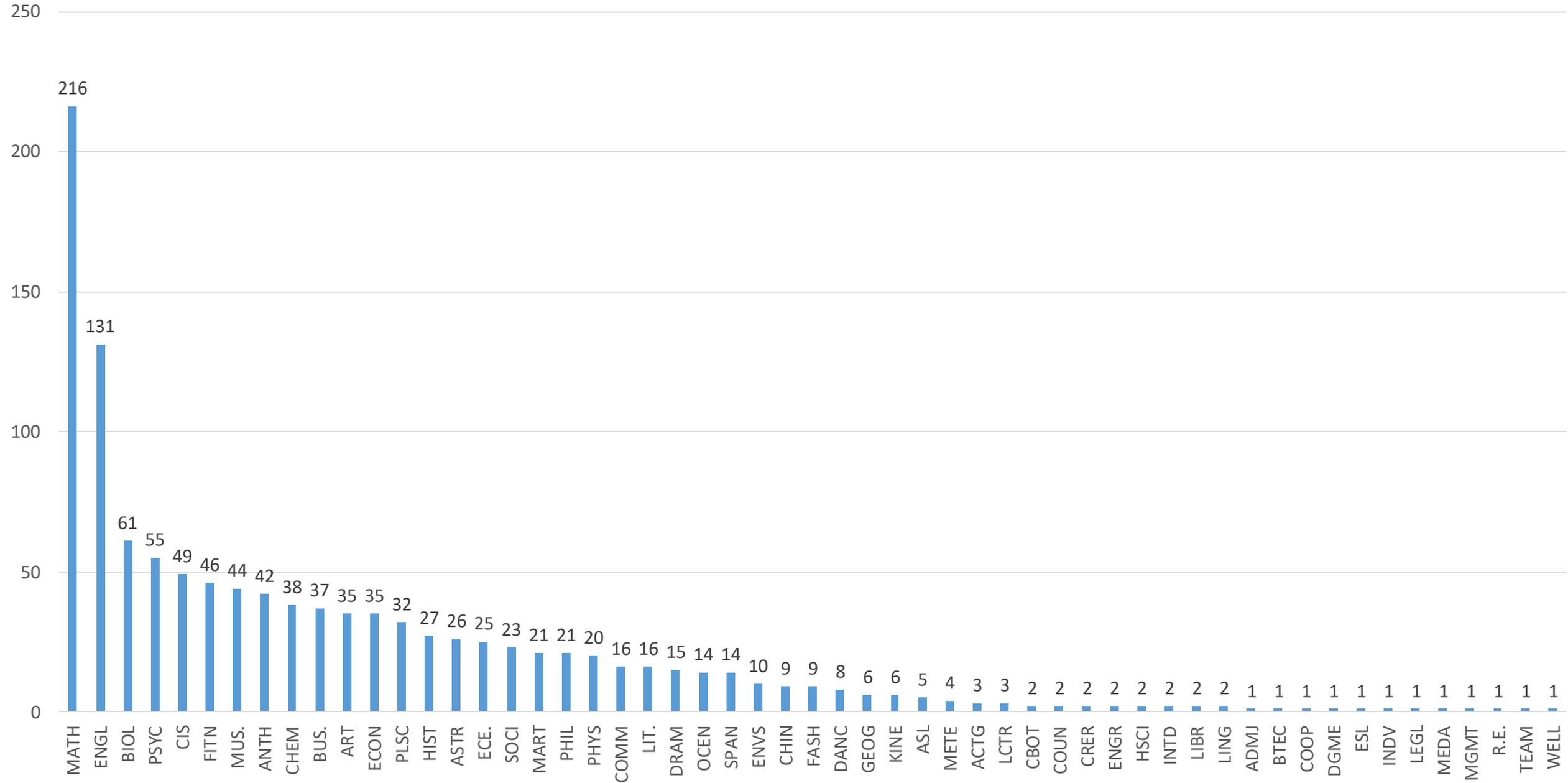

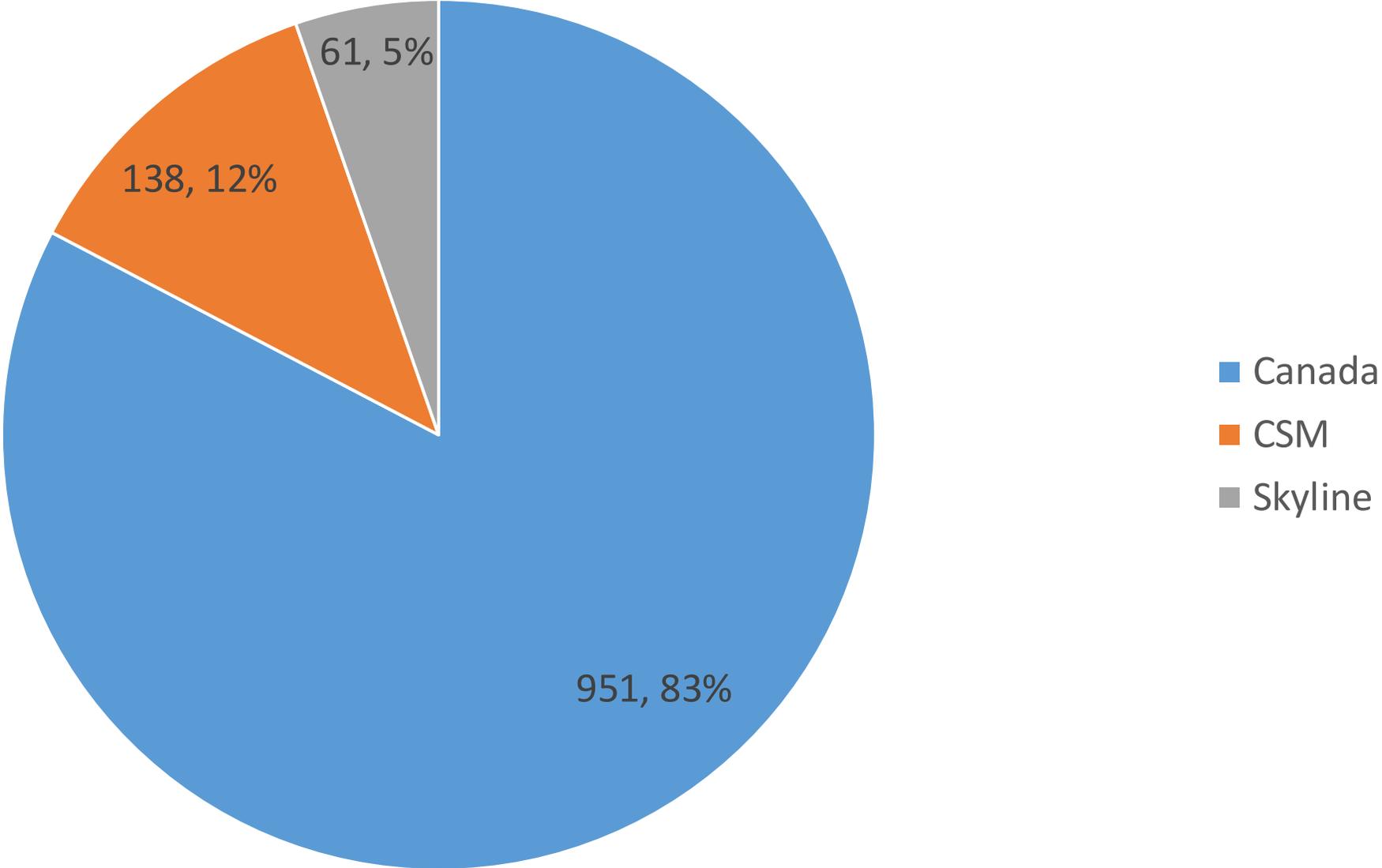

 Canada as primary campus; enrollments at any campus



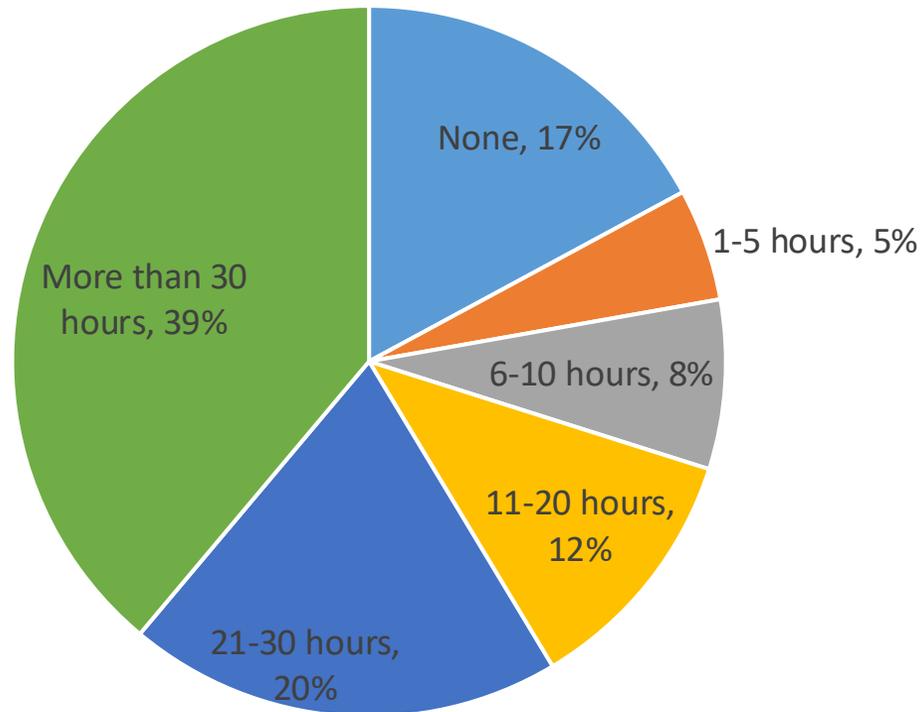
# Concurrently Enrolled High School Students 2018-19
