# What is a Course Equity Audit?

- [TEPSA](#): Equity audits are a leadership tool used to collect the data that informs the process of removing programmatic barriers that impede full participation, access, and opportunity for all students to receive an equitable and excellent education. (Brown & Williams)
- ***Equity audits are often talked about at the institution level, but I wanted to consider what an equity audit would look like at the course level.***

# The Cañada Course Equity Audit Checklist

- Self-Assessment Tool - the checklist is a way for faculty to determine for themselves what is the next step to make their course more equitable and accessible.
- Supportive Guide - the checklist asks guiding questions and offers you suggestions for things to look for and what to look for, as well as additional resources when you need more information on a checkpoint.

## Things to Look For:

- Great First Impression
- Humanizing Language and Presence
- Clear Guidance for How to Start
- Clear Guidance for Help & Contact

### **To Do:** *(Examples)*

- Re-write my policies with a more welcoming/humanized tone
- Record a welcome video - focus on introducing myself and the big learning goals of the course
- Look into Cañada's Getting Started Module template

# Checkpoint #2: Activities

**Main Question:** Do the activities in your course employ UDL principles and demonstrate the value of diversity and inclusion?

## Items to Check:

- Assessment Prompts
- Assessment Instructions

## Things to Look For:

- Opportunities for students to include themselves in their coursework
- [UDL: Vary demands and resources to optimize challenge](#)
- [UDL: Use multiple tools for construction and composition](#)
- [UDL : Optimize individual choice and autonomy](#)

### **To Do:** (Examples)

- Revise my intro discussion - invite students to share more about themselves
- Add options for choice to assignment #3 , let students choose their prompt.

# Checkpoint #3: Content

**Main Question:** Does your course content reflect broad diversity and draw connections between students' lives, their futures, and course content?

## Items to Check:

- Textbook/Course Readings
  - Authors and Sources
- Content Pages
- Additional Media - Videos, articles, audio recordings
  - Perspectives Represented

## Things to Look For:

- Images, authors and sources that reflect the diversity of Cañada students
- Content that draws connections to students' lives and futures and invites students to do the same

### **To Do:** *(Examples)*

- Update module overview page header images to images that are more representative of my students
- Add a context section to pages where I provide students with readings to show them the connection between their lives and the content.

# Checkpoint #4: Interaction

**Main Question:** Does your course include regular substantive interaction that fosters connection and belonging?

## Items to Check:

- Communication Page
  - Office Hours
  - How to Contact Instructor
  - How Instructor will contact students
- Discussions
- Group Work
- Q&A Forum
- Chat

## Things to Look For:

- Contact information is clear and easy to find
- Opportunities for interaction are regularly available throughout the semester

### **To Do:** *(Examples)*

- Look into Pronto
- Update How to Contact me page - add How I'll Contact You section

# Checkpoint #5: Accessibility

**Main Question:** Does your course meet accessibility standards?

## Items to Check:

- Canvas Pages
- Assessment Instructions
- Videos
- External Files
- Accessibility Checkers
  - Canvas
  - Word
  - PowerPoint
  - PDF
  - UDOIT
- Link Validator

## Things to Look For:

- Pages and files should have no errors when accessibility checkers run
- Video should have correct captions, not auto-captions
- Link validator should return no broken links

### **To Do:** *(Examples)*

- Run UDOIT and fix errors
- Replace all videos with auto-captioning with correct captions.
