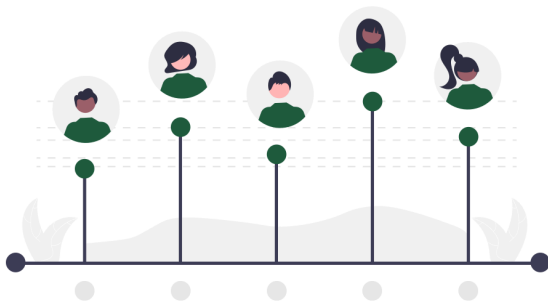
Consider These Factors

- Rubrics promote objective grading, which in turn promotes equity in grading
