# Celebrating AANHPI Heritage Month at Cañada College

In 1990, Congress officially designated May as Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) Heritage Month. May was chosen to honor two significant milestones: the arrival of the first Japanese immigrant, Nakahama Manjiro, to the U.S. on May 7, 1843 and the completion of the first transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869—a project built in large part by Chinese immigrant laborers. Cañada College is proud to be an Asian American Native American Pacific Islander Serving Institution (AANAPISI). Among our student body, 15% identify as Asian, 5% as Filipinx and 1% as Pacific Islander. Cañada's AANHPI community reflects a rich diversity of ethnicities, cultures, identities, languages and immigration stories—contributing to the broader AANHPI population, which includes more than 45 distinct ethnic groups across the United States. Recognizing that May is a busy time with finals and end-of-year activities, Cañada College is celebrating AANHPI Heritage Month across both April and May. # Dr. DeVon Lamar Scott, Director of DRC & PCC

Please welcome Dr. DeVon Lamar Scott, Cañada's new Director of the Disability Resource Center (DRC) and Personal Counseling Center (PCC). DeVon brings more than 23 years of experience in special education, with a career dedicated to supporting students facing academic and non-academic barriers, including linguistic, systemic and cultural challenges. Starting as a middle school special education teacher, he focused on creating culturally responsive, flexible learning environments tailored to individual student strengths. His innovative methods led to measurable gains in student performance. In higher education, DeVon continued this work by promoting inclusive practices and streamlining support services, earning El Camino College's Employee of the Year award for his collaborative, culturally relevant efforts within Student Services.

As a full-time Faculty/DSPS Counselor for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, DeVon led professional development workshops that helped faculty adopt universal design strategies. A passionate advocate for multi-modal instruction, he centers his work on cultural humility and the intersectionality of disability and Deaf culture—drawing from his personal experience with sensorineural hearing loss.

He also co-chaired the 2024 Men of Color Action Network leadership conference, which drew over 600 attendees to Long Beach City College.

DeVon holds a Doctorate in Organizational Innovation from National University, a master's in Rehabilitation Counseling from San Diego State and a bachelor's from CSU Dominguez Hills.

# Adult CPR/AED and First Aid Training

Skyline College will be hosting an Adult CPR/AED and First Aid training on Thursday, April 17, 2025 from 12:30-4:30 p.m. in 6-202 and 6-204. Skyline College has contracted with the American Heart Association to provide the training. The course is open to all district employees and will be capped at 25 participants. The Adult First Aid/CPR/AED course incorporates the latest science and teaches students to recognize and care for a variety of first aid emergencies such as burns, cuts, scrapes, sudden illnesses, head, neck, back injuries, heat and cold emergencies and how to respond to breathing and cardiac emergencies for victims about 12 years and older. Successful students will receive a certificate for Adult First Aid/CPR/AED valid for two years.
