
Educational Master Plan (EMP) : Top 6 for Year 1

In 2022-23, the College will launch the implementation of our new Educational Master Plan for 2022-2027.

Leadership Retreat

As part of the College's **annual planning cycle**, campus leaders will convene for a Leadership Retreat on August 11, 2022 to discuss how to operationalize and implement the strategies contained in the new Educational Master Plan during the coming academic year. The draft annual strategic priorities discussed and refined by Leadership Retreat participants will be presented to the larger campus community on Flex Day (August 16, 2022) and then to the Planning and Budgeting Council during their first meeting on September 7, 2022, at which time the specific actions to be taken and the groups responsible for taking them will be finalized.

To begin the process of identifying lead individuals as well as College Councils, Senates, Committees, and operational groups who will be responsible for implementing the strategic initiatives identified in the Educational Master Plan, College Cabinet and PBC Co Chairs created a **draft EMP implementation matrix**. It is a draft document to be considered by participants in the Leadership Retreat as well as the College Councils, Senates, Committees and operational groups proposed to be responsible for implementing EMP initiatives. 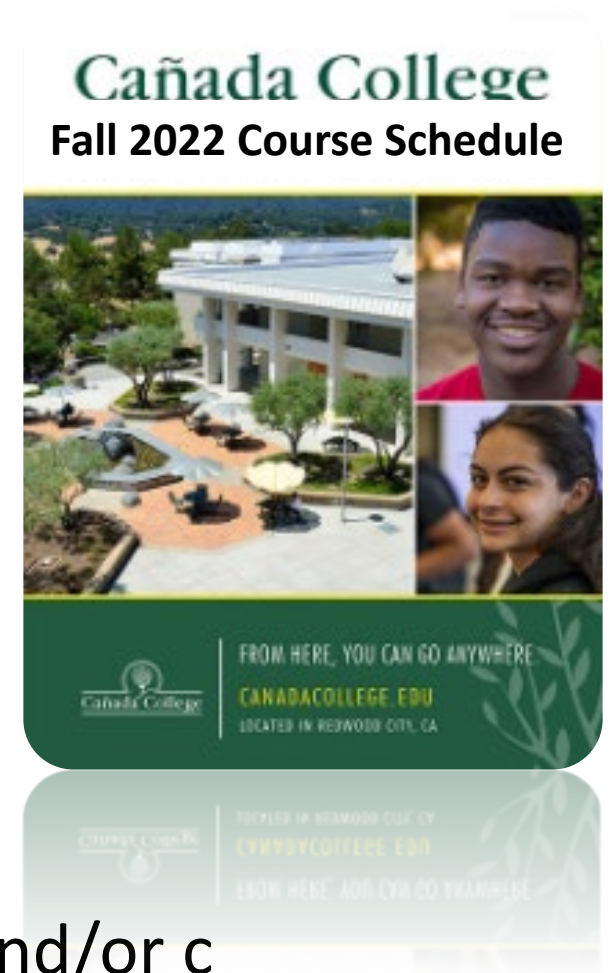

Teaching and Learning Timeline & Updates

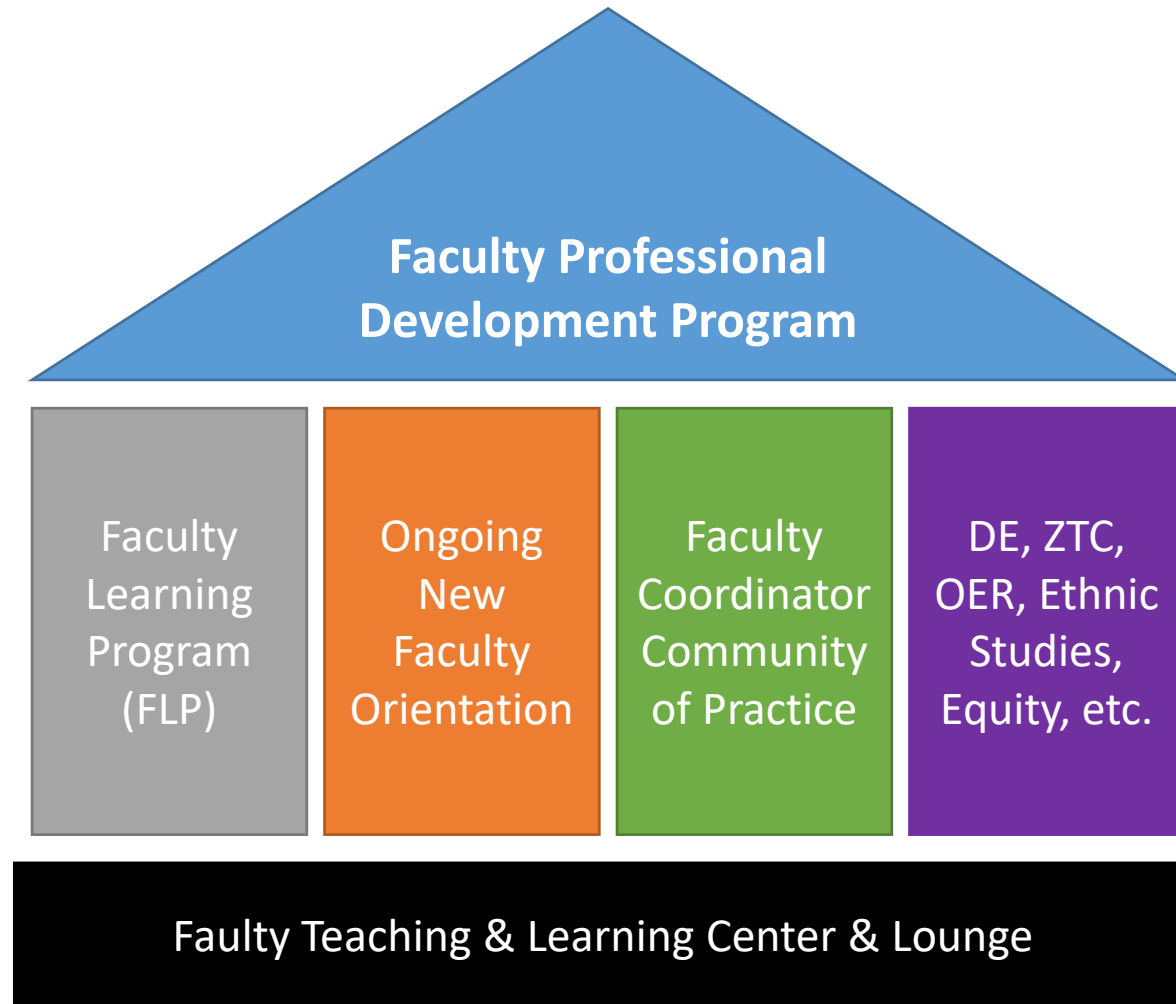
- March 2022: Faculty Teaching and Learning Coordinators started their appointments
- March-May 2022: Sought feedback via survey regarding faculty teaching and learning needs, as well as professional development opportunities that go beyond Flex Day sessions.
- Beginning in March 2022, became part of the campus and district-wide flex planning committees (since the newly appointed faculty flex coordinator would not be able to begin until Fall 2022).
- April 21, 2022: Facilitated Flex Day Session on Teaching and Learning. Gathered feedback on teaching and learning needs, as well as professional development beyond Flex Day sessions.
- April-May 2022: Attended all division meetings to share updates and to gather person-to-person feedback on faculty teaching and learning needs, as well as professional development opportunities that go beyond Flex Day sessions. The survey was also shared.
- March 2022-Summer 2022: Assisted in planning August Flex Day.
- August 16, 2022: Facilitated Flex Day Sessions on “New Faculty Welcome & Orientation”, “All Faculty Coordinator Meeting” and “Instructional Support Workshop”
- August 23, 2022: Met with Kim, Ludmilla, Jessica, Lezlee, Chialin and Karen Pinkham in the Faculty Teaching and Learning Center & Lounge to discuss “CIETL” refresh/redesign
- September 16, 2022: Faculty Learning Program (FLP) Coordinator approved (Ray Laupz will start Fall 2022, faculty cohort to begin Spring 2023)
- Regular Teaching and Learning Workshops have been held in the Faculty Teaching and Learning Center & Lounge every Tuesdays and Wednesdays

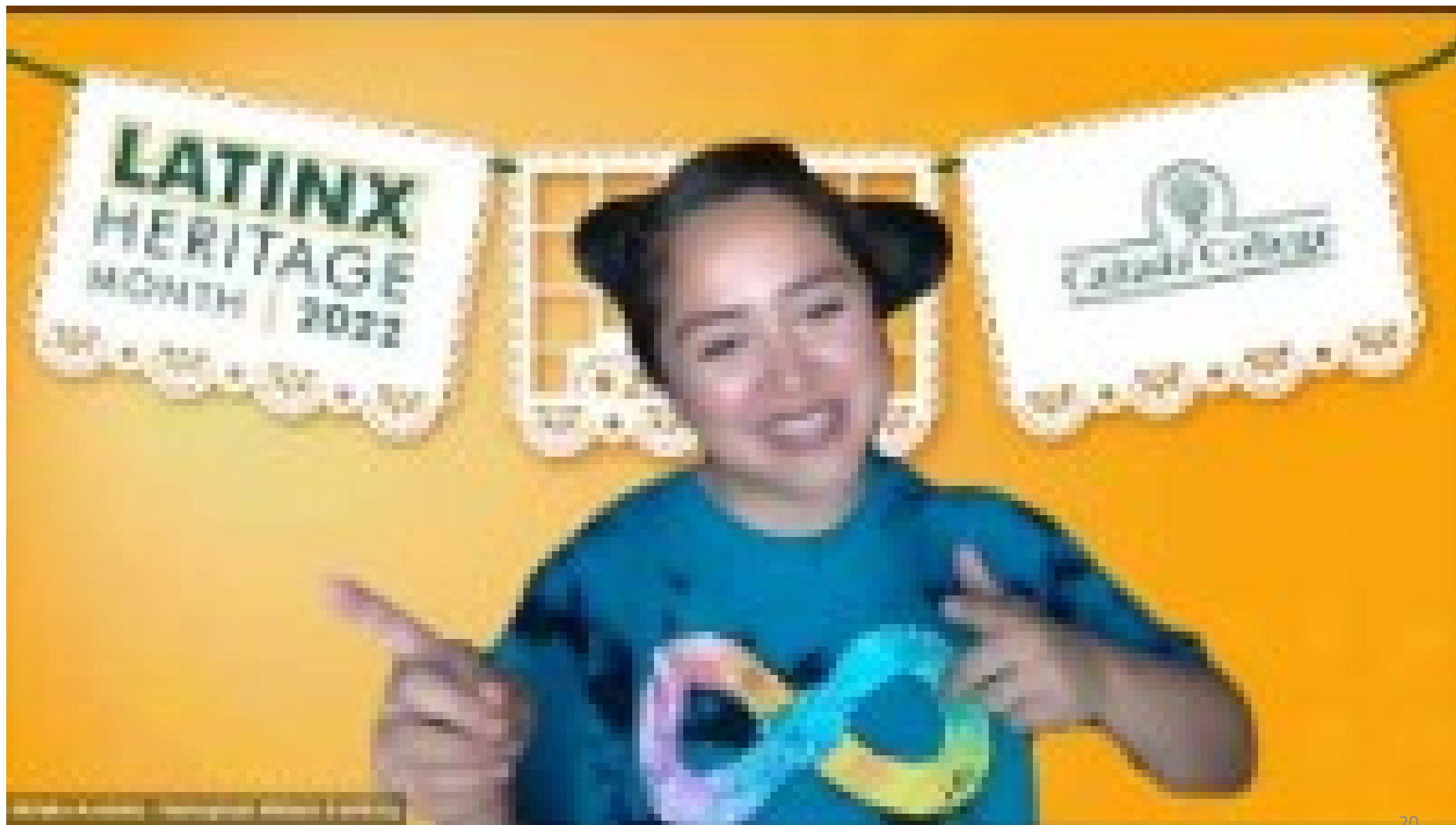

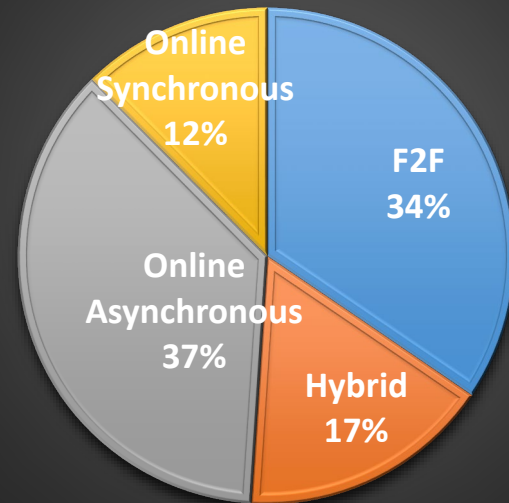

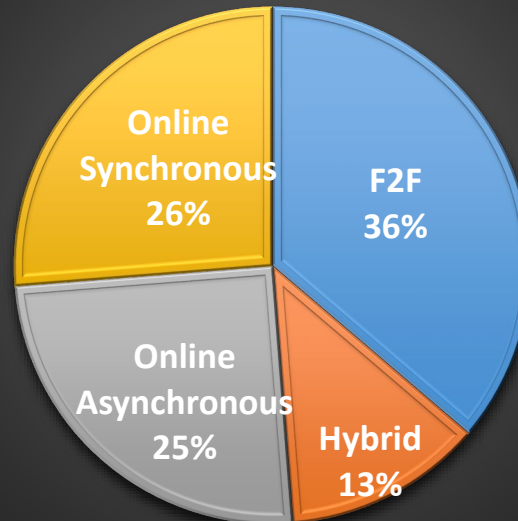

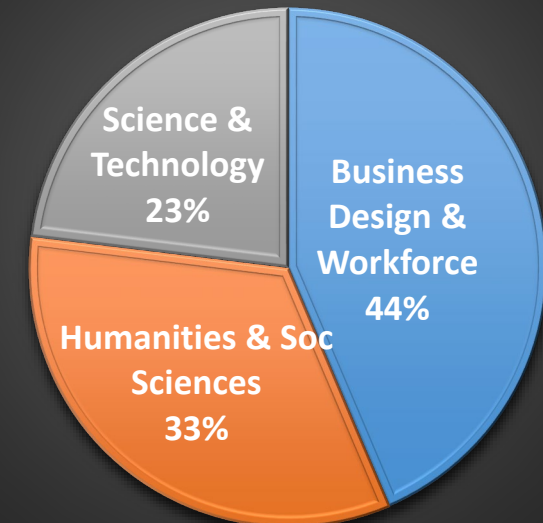
Non Cross-Listed Course Section (N=339)

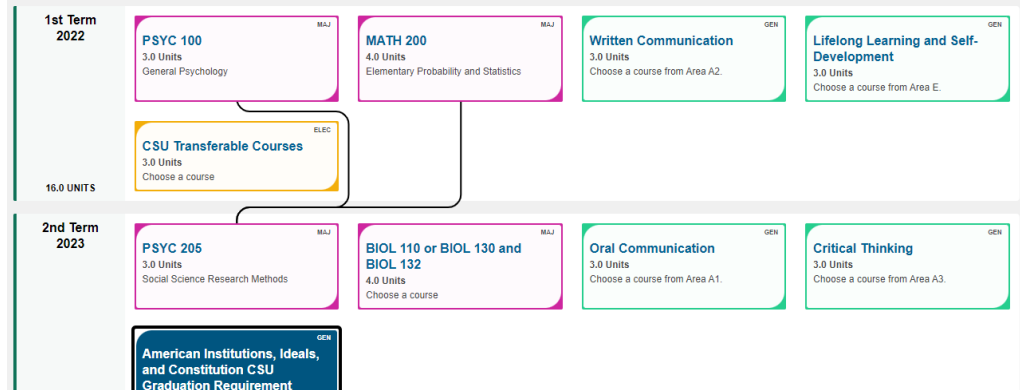
