Financial Aid Update: We've been bombarded with outreach requests (YAY!), as schools have been reaching out to help out with their cash for college events. We have about 8 C4C in October. Also, we are going to begin awarding emergency funding to eligible students as early as tomorrow. We hope to disburse the funding by the end of this month.

Outreach has been busy! We have been planning to participate in various community events (such as Fiestas Patrias in downtown RWS). We are co-hosting College night in the community (at PAL) and are also meeting with all high school counselors to plan info and application workshops at all of our feeder high schools. We have also collaborating with looping the FA team to help schedule cash for college events at all of our high schools. Promise Scholars Program: We have a total of 465 students in the Full Time Program, where 243 students are part of our Fall 2022 cohort. We also onboarded 2 new tenure counselors, Danny Lynch and Kassie Alexander. We hold our first in-person meeting yesterday where Danny presented on Time Management. We are now recruiting for Spring 2023, our application is open until January 20th, 2023. Mayra Arellano

SparkPoint - 1. The Food Pantry is booming! We served 160 unduplicated families last week and are serving around 250 families per month. A big thanks to Nohemy Colin for her hard work in making this possible. 2. SparkPiont Free Farmer's Market will open on October 11 in Lot 6. This distribution will be open every Tuesday from 11am to 1pm. For those of you who were here pre-COVID, it will be like the Community Markets located in the main quad. VI. Standing Items

a. PBC Max Hartman 2

PBC also met in 3-104.

SB 893, which, if signed, would make community college free for students in San Mateo County. The bill is authored by State Senator Josh Becker and co-authored by Assemblymembers Marc Berman and Kevin Mullin. The bill would allow the SMCCCD to use general Fund 1 dollars to support students' total cost of attendance that could include tuition, fees, text books, living expenses, transportation expenses, technology, study abroad, and child and dependent care for the campuses that have childcare centers. It will be a five-year pilot.

The Board of Trustees will adopt a policy around defining financial need. Students who are non-residents but who meet the district's definition of undocumented students would be eligible, however other non-resident students or international students would not. There are just over 13,000 students in the SMCCCD. After looking at criteria from last year as well as students who qualified for the Community College Promise Grant and do not pay for enrollment, there are about 5,000 students from last year that have been looked at. Overall, a conservative estimate might cost the district \$4.7million in the spring semester.

Next steps:

- Interim policies are being brought for action by the Board on September 8 to allow time to complete programming set up for Spring 2023. The interim policy is in the September 8 board package posted on the board website.
- The district will work with participatory governance groups to finalize permanent policies during the Fall 2022 semester.
- Policies and three-year fiscal impact projections will be brought to the board for approval for the 2023-2024 academic year in time to inform budget development.

Students who are undocumented, non-residents but live in San Mateo County and have 6 or fewer units can receive a Non-Resident Tuition Fee Waiver to waive enrollment fees and out of state fees for any of the colleges in our District. Cañada has 35 students registered to use this waiver so far.

c. Enrollment Services Committee Update

ESC met on September 27, 2022

ESC discussed SB893 during the meeting which Manuel discussed above. There is no limit on how many units students can take to receive this waiver. Below is the possible Board Policy if SB893 is signed by the governor.

Upon the effective date of Senate bill (SB) 893, the following interim policies for the waiver of fees will go

into effect for the Spring 2023 semester.

- 1. In order to qualify for support authorized by SB 893, students must:
 - a. Reside within the boundaries of the San Mateo County Community College District (SMCCCD), which are coterminous with the borders of San Mateo County; and
 - b. Not be international students or other non-resident students, except as identified as students eligible for the Non-Resident Tuition Fee Waiver for Undocumented Students (BP XX.XX).
- 2. Students who qualify in the following categories will be exempted from payment of the enrollment

fee:

- a. Students who will be receiving any California College Promise Grant (CCPG); or
- b. Students who meet the residency criteria described in section 1 above, and do not otherwise receive CCPG.
- 3. Students who qualify in the following categories will be exempted from payment of the health fee, student body fee, student representation fee, student union fee, inclusive access fee(s), and materials fee(s)
 - a. Students who will be receiving any California College Promise Grant (CCPG); or
 - b. Students who have documented financial need as defined by an expected family contribution (EFC) of up to 600% of CCPG Type C EFC 2022-23 eligibility thresholds:
 - For dependent students, 600% EFC = \$118,494
 - For independent students, 600% EFC = \$170,058
- 4. Students who meet the residency criteria described in section 1 above and are eligible for the Non-Resident Tuition Fee Waiver for Undocumented Students (BP XX.XX) will have the non-resident tuition waived for all enrolled units.

Foster Youth Success Initiative (FYSI) is a statewide effort supported by the California Community College Chancellor's Office. The purpose of the FYSI is to create a network of support that will meet the academic, social, emotional, and financial needs of collegebound students. The program is full committed to empowering these youth to become self-supporting, conscious community leaders, role models, and competent professionals in their fields of interest. In addition, they are provided a comprehensive support program to increase the number of former foster youth graduating from a community college with an associate's degree, vocation training, or transferring to a four-year university.

The Resources & Opportunities for Success & Excellence (R.O.S.E.). This program in collaboration with San Mateo County, the Foster Youth Success Initiative (F.Y.S.I.) and Foster & Kinship Care Education Programs have created a network of support to empower Foster Youth students by creating a community of practice that consists of allies who are faculty, staff, and community partners.

Jillian Gomez created Canvas shell so as students identify whether it's on their college application, Dream Act application or on their FASFA that they are Foster Youth, Jillian puts them in the Canvas shell so they are linked to us directly and as soon as possible. She also created a blurb that we share with faculty and ask faculty if they can add this blurb onto their syllabus similar to what DRC does.

Also we hosted two workshops last year during Flex Day. We'll be doing another one in October that is focusing on Foster Youth. This workshop will be open to all Faculty and Staff. Sarita Santos, ECE instructor, is leading our effort in the Community of Practice for any faculty or staff interested in being a Foster Youth liaison to support our Foster Youth students.

We receive no funds from the state so because of the grant we've received, we've been able to provide grants to our foster youth for the last 4 semesters and we've been able to pay for the Career class.

Please take review the sketch and give us your feedback by noon on Friday, September 16, 2022.


